

Student safety and Issue 8 of The Lookout!

For many young people, September means a new term at school or university. For university students, those first few weeks and months should be fun and exciting, and might be the first time they've moved to a new city or house. This exciting period of change can also bring new challenges around safety and responsibility.

It is well known that young people (aged 16 - 24) are disproportionately more likely to be victims of crime. Despite this, statistics on campus crime are only patchily recorded by many UK universities and just a handful make the information available to would-be students. A recent article from UniFresher explores the <u>"top 10 most dangerous universities in the UK for 2023"</u> and looks at which are the most reported crimes on campus/ in student accommodation. There's plenty that young people can do to keep themselves safe and aware, and plenty that we can do as Neighbourhood Watch to help them stay safe and enjoy their time at university! Our termly student magazine **The Lookout** is full of advice from other students, and provides a platform for young people's voices to be heard.



Issue 8 of The Lookout is a bumper Fresher's issue, with articles and illustrations from six talented students on hard-hitting topics including **harassment on campus**, the **safety and security of student housing**, and advice on **making the most of the first few weeks at university**.

Since the first Youth Council meeting in May, twenty 16-24year-olds have been busy exploring, analysing, and problem-solving the community, crime, and safety issues that matter to them. From concerns around antisocial behaviour, grooming, shoplifting, safety at night, and hate crime, the Council is currently in the thick of actively influencing 'on-the-ground' social change in communities across England and Wales, plus youth strategy within NWN.

Community Grants

Empowering Communities to Create Safer Neighbourhoods

Our Community Grants Programme is a popular (and much anticipated) initiative, designed to support local communities in enhancing safety and well-being. By providing funding, we empower residents to do more of their important work.

The Grant programme offers funding for a wide range of community projects. This time, we have set out the kind of activity that we are keen to fund:

- Tackling Antisocial Behaviour Improving the community environment
 - **Examples:** Litter picks equipment and publicity, planting a community area to try to reclaim an area from ASB
- Increasing membership of local watches
 - **Examples:** Purchasing and utilising NW merchandise to increase memberships of watches or associations
- Addressing crime through Community Cohesion
 - **Examples:** Crime prevention event, meet the local policing team, find out more about NW in your area, Community Crime Audit
- Tackling loneliness in our Neighbourhood Watch communities
 - **Examples**: Outreach activity contacting isolated or elderly people in the community to invite them to events, or to join a watch
